


Figure 1 Goodwood Lodge #159 GRC exterior 2013

Goodwood Trivia

Record Number of degrees in one Day: 3 degrees were conferred in one night for Brother Edward Good who was going overseas. He became Master of Goodwood in 1934.

<u>Meeting days based on cycles of the moon:</u> Members used to meet Tuesday on or before full moon to allow travel by night via horse and cart. All calendars included the phases of the moon. It changed to every 1st Tuesday of the month some time in the 1970's

<u>Meeting time</u>: The time of the meeting used to be 8pm to give the farmers time to finish their Chores. It was changed in the 1970's to tyling at 7:30 pm.

<u>Installations:</u> Installation of a new master used to be done by the master of the lodge all from memory with no help except from officers in the Chairs.

<u>Penmanship:</u> In an age where handwriting is not being taught in schools any more, consider the beautiful penmanship of Goodwood's original Bylaws

Goodwood Lodge #159 GRC The early years


The following is taken from *Ottawa District - Then and Now Freemasonry in Eastern Ontario* 1855 – 2010 by V.W. Bro. Michael Jenkyns.

Richmond had been named in 1818 after the 4th Duke of Richmond, Charles Lennox, who had been appointed as governor-in-chief of Canada that same year. While on a tour of settlements in Lower and Upper Canada in 18189, he was bitten by a rabid fox at William Henry (now Sorel, Quebec) and after visiting Richmond, he died of rabies on August 28, 1819 in a barn-cum-tavern believed to have been at present-day Fallowfield.

The Lennox family was linked with Freemasonry from the time of King Charles II. Charles Lennox, the natural son of Charles II and the Duchess of Portsmouth was born in 1672 and, in 1675, was created Duke of Richmond, Earl of March and Baron of Settringham in the peerage of England and Duke of Lennox, Earl of Darnley and Baron Methuen of Torbolton in the peerage of Scotland. He also inherited the Dukedom of Aubigny in France from his mother, Louise de Kerouvalle. This first Duke of Richmond was the Master of a Working Lodge in Chichester, Sussex in 1692. His son, Charles, the 2nd Duke of Richmond, was Master of the Lodge which met at the Rummer and Grapes Tavern and which was one of the four founding Lodges of the (premier) Grand Lodge of England on June 24, 1717, and he was the eighth Grand Master of that Grand Lodge in 1724. The 3rd Duke of Richmond was the eldest surviving son of the Charles, 2nd Duke of Richmond and his wife, Sarah. The 3rd Duke has no linkage with Freemasonry and died without issue. The title reverted to the family line of the 2nd Duke of Richmond and was settled on Charles Lennox as the 4th Duke of Richmond. R. W. Bro. Charles Lennox held the office of Provincial Grand Master of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Sussex from 1814 until his death in 1819.

In an interesting and little-known parallel relationship between two well-known Masons, the future Duke of Wellington served on the staff of the 4th Duke of Richmond early in his career and at Waterloo, the 4th Duke served on the staff of the Duke of Wellington. It was the 4th Duke of Richmond's wife who arrangedfor the ball in Brussels on the eye of Waterloo.

The area in and around Richmond has benefitted from Masons since about 1808. Early Lodges operated under a variety of Warrants, both military (No. 683 IC/863 ER, in the 89th Regiment of Foot) and civilian (Lodge on the Rideau, No. 25 PRUC(A), Burritt's Rapids 1814-1846; Lodge at Morphy's Falls¹⁴⁶, no known number, 1821-1825; Richmond Lodge, No. 24 PRUC, Richmond, 1821-1845; Kemptville Lodge, No. 25 PRCW, Kemptville 1845-1858 and now Mount Zion Lodge, No. 28 GRC, Kemptville; Lodge at North Gower Corners, No. 48 PRCW, North Gower 1854-1858; and Doric Lodge, now No. 58 GRC, Ottawa 1855-present) and the present Goodwood Lodge.

Goodwood Lodge was founded by six Richmond Masons who belonged to Doric Lodge — Bros. Rev. Charles Biggar Pettit, John McElroy, Edward Reilly (owner and operator of the livery stable and hotel at Richmond), John Torney, Johnson Fenton and James Salmon. When Bro. John McElroy died, Doric Lodge held an emergent meeting on May 28, 1861, to conduct a Masonic burial service in the Anglican Church Cemetery at Richmond. This event precipitated the other Richmond Masons to agree to form a new Lodge and on June 3, 1863, the minutes of Doric Lodge indicate that "A request from Rev. Bro. C.B. Pettit asking the officers of this lodge to assist in establishing a lodge at Richmond and to forward a petition to Grand Lodge was sanctioned immediately." A Dispensation to form a Masonic Lodge in Richmond, to be named Goodwood, was issued on September 29, 1863 by the Grand Lodge of Canada.

The Lodge was represented at the 9th Annual Communication of Grand Lodge (July 13, 1864, Hamilton) by W.Bro. John P. Featherstone as proxy. For the Masonic year 1864, R. W. Bro. Robert Lyon of Goodwood Lodge was elected District Deputy Grand Master of the Central District. In his address, G rand Master M.W. Bro. Thom as Douglas Harington, noted that he had granted eight dispensations during the year, one of which was issued to form "Goodwood Lodge at Richmond C.W.", and that "The petitions in each case, were strongly and regularly recommended, and I trust Grand Lodge will confirm them by Warrants." In its report, the Board of General Purposes recommended Warrants be issued to all eight Lodges and Warrant No. 159 was issued bearing date July 14, 1864.

The name of the Lodge is derived from the Duke of Richmond's estates in Chichester, Sussex, England.

The founder (charter) members of Goodwood Lodge were: Bro. Rev. Charles Biggar Pettit (rector of St. John the Baptist Anglican Church, Richmond) who became first W M; R. W. Bro. Robert Lyon (a founder member of Corinthian Lodge, No. 59 GRC, Ottawa and W M in 1862, and DDG M of Ottawa District in 1863-64; he was elected as Mayor of Ottawa in 1867; died 1887 in a fatal duel in Perth on the banks of the river Tay); Bro. George Keating (initiated Sussex Lodge No. 5 GRC, Brockville, and affiliated with Doric No. 50 GRC, in 1857. Gave his profession as clerk); Johnson E. Fenton (member of North Gower No. 48 and one-time Reeve of Huntley Township; he demitted in 1865 and had never held office in the Lodge); Bro. William Cowan (member of North Gower No. 48; member of North Gower Council and Reeve from 1865 to 1869; County Clerk of the Division Court of North Gower and Marlborough and Carleton County Treasurer; died 1899); Dr. Collar Munson Church (charter member of Renfrew No. 122 and was jail surgeon in Ottawa; died 1889); and Edward Reilly (innkeeper of Reilly's Hotel and stable owner in Richmond).

At the beginning, Doric Lodge agreed to provide Goodwood Lodge with their surplus furniture, much of which had originally been given to Doric from earlier lodges in the Richmond area which had ceased working. The jewels of the original Richmond Lodge, No. 24 PRUC, which had been made by Solomon Marion (1782-1832), a French-Canadian silversmith, were inherited by Goodwood Lodge.

Goodwood Lodge originally voted to meet on the Tuesday on or before the full moon. In 1891 this was amended to the Wednesday on or before the full moon but was changed to the original Tuesday night in December 1904. The first Tuesday in the month was adopted as the meeting night effective January 1965

From 1863 to 1912 Goodwood Lodge met in several locations including Reilly's Hotel, above McElroy's store, and in a wooden building on Murray Street. The Murray Street building was sold off in 1897 although the Lodge must have remained there as a tenant as there is no indication in the *Lodge History* that it went elsewhere before settling into its present location. In 1912 the Lodge purchased the present land which had earlier held a Methodist Church from 1877-1900 when it burned to the ground and the lot remained unused. The cornerstone for the present Lodge building was laid on June 29, 1918 and the Lodge Rooms occupied in 1919.

Goodwood Lodge has always supported masonic activities and assisted in the formation of new Lodges. In 1904, nine members of Goodwood Lodge were charter members of Carleton Lodge, No. 465 G RC, Carp (Bros. George H. Groves, James Argue, Robert Richardson, George Armstrong, Humphries G ow, Howard Graham, William Richardson, Frederick S. Richardson and Rev. J. D. McCallum). The following year, 1905, the Lodge voted to support the formation of Corinthian Lodge, No. 476 GRC, North Gower and most of Corinthian's charter members were from Goodwood Lodge (W. Bros. Clarke Craig, Dr. Albert E. McCordick, John H. Cryderm an and Bros. Edward Mills, Robert Pratt, Rupert Dumbrille, William Bell, Austen W. McCordick, James E. Armstrong, George Ferguson, James Craig and John H. Wallace). In 1914, Goodwood Lodge supported the formation of Hazeldean Lodge, No. 517 GRC, Hazeldean and again provided a core (18) of the charter members (W. Bros. Robert Richardson, J. A. Cummings and Robert Henry Grant (who would serve as DDGM in 1917) and Bros. Albert Bradley, G

eorge Green, W. P. Hand, Armour Gracey, Albert Fleming, Albert Argue, A. McCormick, W. H. McGuire, T. H. Mattingly, R. E. Williams, T. A. Hand, T. W. Bice, John Wall, J. E. Steele and George Bradley). Goodwood supported the formation of Bytown Lodge, No. 721 GRC, Ottawa in 1966 and provided one charter member to the new Lodge (V. W. Bro. Alfred Harrington).

In keeping with one of the underlying principles of Freemasonry, benevolence has always been a key element of the Lodge's activities. In 1892 the members were requested to pay the following year's dues in advance, if possible, so that the Lodge could provide benevolence to the orphaned children of deceased members.

Goodwood Lodge performed its patriotic duty in two world wars. Dues of members who had enlisted for overseas service were exempted from payment "so long as the member continues in active service." And adjustments in the work ing of the Lodge were occasionally required and approved under dispensation, as on August 20, 1918 when Bro. Edward R. Good was initiated, passed and raised in the same evening and then left a few days later for overseas. During World War II the Lodge established a committee to oversee assistance to British children who had been sent to Canada for safety. Serving brethren were again granted a remission of dues while on active service. Funds for food parcels were collected and forwarded and parcels were sent to Britain on a regular basis as late as 1947.

The *Lodge History* notes the existence, in Richmond, of a curious cornerstone bearing a square and compasses and the date 5823 across the top and AD 1823 across the bottom. The stone had apparently belonged to the first Anglican Church in Richmond which had been destroyed by fire sometime prior to 1860. From 1860 to 1904 the stone formed part of the walk leading to the manse. It was incorporated in the present St. John's Anglican Church and can be seen by going through the vestibule and entering the Church proper where it has been set into the wall immediately on the left.

Some items of interest regarding Goodwood Lodge include: (1) dues were raised to \$6.00 in 1920 and to \$30.00 in 1980; (2) electrifying the Masonic hall occurred in 1927; (3) the summer recess of July and August was adopted in June 1930; (4) the depression forced a reduction in the initiation fee from \$40.00 to \$25.00 in order to attract new members and by 1980 this had been increased to \$100.00; (5) an oil space heater was added to the Lodge room in 1956 as a supplement to the "old wood-burning furnace";

- (6) "modern" plumbing based on a drill well for water and a septic tank for discharge dates from 1964; and
- (7) Kitchener Chapter, No. 210 GRC, originally meeting in the facilities of Russell Lodge, began discussions with Goodwood Lodge and the Temple Board regarding the Chapter's possible move to new quarters in Richmond.

Goodwood Lodge celebrated its Centennial on October 15, 1963.



Since 1918, Richmond-area Freemasons have held their meetings in a red brick building at 3494 McBean St. in Richmond. There, the windows have always had curtains drawn. The door has always been locked (except for the monthly meetings.) And unless you were a Mason in good standing, you could only guess at what were incide.

That will change on the weekend of May 25-26 when the Goodwood Lodge — one of the oldest Masonic lodges in Eastern Ontario — throws open its doors as part of the Doors Open Ottawa weekend.

"We are looking upon Doors

ful Master of the asonic Lodge in Open as an opportunity to

teach people a little bit about Freemasonry," says Mr. Harrison. "We are not as secretive as we used to be, and maybe it's time people learned Freemasonry is nothing to be sared of, that we do a lot of charity work, that we're your neighbours and co-workers."

Freemasonry began, according to the myths and legends of the fraternity, in biblical times, as a secret fraternity founded by the stonemasons who built Solomore, Temple.

by the stonemasons who built Solomon's Temple. There is little evidence of this, though, and for practical purposes the history of the fraternity begins in the Middle Ages, among the masons who built the grand castles, abbeys and cathedrals of the Britain.

These masons formed guilds, which over the centuries became quasi-religious in nature. To be a Freemason, and belong

The series: The first Doors Open festival took place in Glasgow in 1990. Since then, nearly 20 million people have attended similar festivals across Europe. Inside Goodwood Lodge, although there are some perfectly cut stones placed in front of a few ornate chairs ("I can't tell you why," says Mr. Harrison, "Internet again,") most visitors will likely notice other artifects.

There is a wooden travelling organ, dating from the early 19th century. The organ folds up to the size of a small trunk,

some rouge to masome rouge for the regular monthly meetings.

There are pictures on the walls of some famous Freema sons — from the poet Robbit Burns to former U.S. president George Bush.

There is even a chair that belonged to the fourth Duke of Richmond, a Freemason who visited the area shortly after the War of 1812. (He was also one of the unlucidest men to ever walk the streets of Richmond. While fox hunting one day in 1819, the duke was bitten by a rabid fox He died shortly afterwards, and is buried beneath the altar of Holy Trinity Anglican Church in Quebec City.)

"There's a lot of history inside these walls," says Mr. Harrison, after he has changed out of his jeans and cowhoy boots, and is formally aftired in a Worshipful Master's apron and collar to have his photograph taken.

"When people visit us for Doors Open, I hope they get a sense of that."



Ontario Grand Master visits Goodwood Lodge

The New Year of 2005 got off to a gala start for the Goodwood Masonic Lodge of Richmond when the Grand Master responsible for all of the Masons in Ontario visited on Tuesday, January 4.

A banquet featuring a head table highlighting Donald Mumby, the Grand Master of Canada in the Province of Ontario, who is the head of all Masons in Ontario, and Henry Harrison, the Master of Goodwood Lodge, was held in the hall at St. Paul's United Church, just up McBean Street from Goodwood Lodge.

Also at the head table at this banquet was Aubrey Moodie of Richmond, who joined the Goodwood Masonic Lodge 60 years ago this year.

It is believed that this is the first time in the 142 year history of Goodwood Lodge, which was founded in 1863, that a Grand Master responsible for all Masons in Ontario visited the Lodge. Grand Master Mumby visited the Lodge in Richmond simply because he was invited to visit those Lodges that invite him to visit, was pleased to accept the invitation and responded that January 4, 2005, would be an available opportunity. 


Figure 29 R. W. Bro. William Dornan Cook with his new Secretary's Desk




Figure 37 W. Bro. Jack Hogg and W. Bro. Chris Hogg




Figure 53 R. W. Bro. William Dornan Cook




Figure 54 R. W. Bro. Roy Hyland




Figure 64 W. Bro. Roy Hyland

Architecture mathematics and Goodwood Lodge building

400 years ago the great German astronomer Johannes Kepler said:

"Geometry has two great treasures: One is the Theorem of Pythagoras; the other, the division of a line into extreme and mean ratio. The first we may compare to a measure of gold; the second we may name a precious jewel."

We are all familiar with the Pythagorean theory and may agree with Kepler that it is indeed a measure of gold, but what of the division of a line into the mean and extreme ratio? It sounds a very strange to describe a rather mundane division of a line into a mean and extreme ratio as a "precious jewel", so let's take a look at this a little more carefully and find out why Keplar and other geometricians have such a high regard for this ratio.

During the lecture I will show that the "Golden Ratio" as it is now called has been preserved in our lodges and is in full view for us to discover

So what is the golden ratio?

If a line is broken at a particular point, the length of the longer (extreme) line divided by the length of this shorter (mean) line is equal to the Golden Ratio.

The Golden Ratio is given the Greek symbol "phi" for use in mathematical equations.

So how does a mathematician calculate the golden ratio? Most phones now have calculators included in their applications so anyone with a phone can calculate phi: First calculate the square root of 5 (=2.2360679...) and then add 1 which gives 3.2360679 and then divide by 2

The answer is 1.6180339887498......etc and it goes on. The golden ratio is not a whole number but an imperfect, recurring number.

The Golden Ratio has some unique and curious mathematical properties.

But this mathematical curiosity is not the only reason why Kepler referred to the extreme and mean ratio as a precious jewel.

The Golden Ratio features prominently in nature in everything from the arrangement of seeds in a sun flower to the proportions of the human body. For example, in humans, the navel divides our bodies into the Golden Ratio – the proportions of the facial features and the joints in our fingers exhibit the Golden Ratio.

The Greeks recognised that the use of the Golden Ratio in their buildings enhanced their aesthetic appeal. Some of the most beautiful buildings of ancient Greece (e.g. the Parthenon in Athens), reportedly incorporate the golden ratio into their architecture.

If Masonry is founded on geometry, or indeed is synonymous with geometry as the book of work tells us, then Masonry must abound with reflections of the two great treasures of Geometry - Pythagoras Theorem and the division of a line into the mean and extreme ratio.

These two great treasures of Geometry are indeed before us in open view.

First Pythagoras Theorem:

The steps of 9, 12 and 15 inches taken by the candidate during initiation are Pythagorean numbers $(9^2 + 12^2 = 15^2)$.

The past masters jewel has a depiction of Pythagoras theorem (squares on each face of a right angled triangle)

Pythagoras is referred to by name in the third paragraph of the Junior Wardens lecture so it appears that this theorem is in open view.

But where is the golden ratio in our lodges? We have to do some further research to discover this hidden treasure:

Let's begin with the book of the work:

The Junior Warden's lecture states that a Masonic lodge consists of ornaments, furniture and jewels. The ornaments are the Mosaic Pavement, the indented skirting that surrounds the pavement and the star in the centre:

- The indented border is an emblem full of hope o those who trust – as all masons profess to do – in the great architect of the universe. It prefigures the blessings derived from a steady dependence upon divine providence which has its symbol in the star that gleams in the centre.

Clearly the indented skirting is a very significant geometric object to be given the status of a lodge ornament.

In most masonic lodges the indented skirting is composed of triangles that have the same height as the width of their bases. These triangles are formed from the combination of two congruent, right angled triangles each side has length 1, 2, and $\sqrt{5}$.

The golden ratio is $(1+\sqrt{5})/2$ therefore the indented skirting is displaying for us in clear view the mathematics of the golden ratio.

It is not only the indented skirting which displays the 1, 2 and $\sqrt{5}$ triangle. This triangle is shown by every mason in the second degree.

The sign of fidelity in the second degree requires the forearm to be placed in such a position as to form a right angled triangle with the upper arm. Leonardo Davinci's depiction of a man with perfect proportions (the so called Vitruvian man inscribed in a circle within a square). Leonardo's picture includes a scale at the bottom of the picture. This scale can be used to measure the relative dimensions of the arms and shoulders. Leonardo's picture shows that a ma's forearm (elbow to outstretched fingertips) is twice the length of his upper arm. The hailing sign or sign of supplication therefore exemplifies a right angled triangle with sides in the ratio 1, 2 and $\sqrt{5}$.

Similarly, the sign of fidelity, if given by Leonardo's Vitruvian Man (shoulders twice as long as his upper arm) would form a triangle of sides 1, 2 and $\sqrt{5}$.

It is interesting to note that if the two triangles from the sign of fidelity and the sign of supplication were put together they would form a triangle height 2 and base length 2.

This important triangle features prominently in our lodge ornaments. The indented skirting in most lodges is made up of these triangles that have height 2 and base 2 triangles with root 5 diagonals.

The Junior Wardens lecture reminds us that the indented skirting is an emblem full of hope to those who trust, as all masons profess to do, in the great architect of the universe.

The implicit connection of the indented skirting to the mathematics of the golden ratio is one good reason why the indented skirting is singled out as an ornament in a masonic lodge.

The third lodge ornament (the pentagonal star) is connected to the pentagonal dodecahedron a twelve sided figure where every face is a pentagonal star. This 3 dimensional object was an ancient symbol for the universe and caused quite a stir when it was first invented by ancient Greeks.

The five pointed star is a personification of the golden ratio:

The distance between opposite points divided by the distance between neighbouring points is exactly the golden ratio.

The lines between opposing points cut each other in the golden ration.

Thus the pentagonal star in the centre contains no fewer than 15 representations of the golden ratio.

Thus, in summary, each of the 3 lodge ornaments is connected to the golden ratio.

This is not the end of the list of items in Goodwood lodge that are representative of the golden ratio. The star hangs from the ceiling as if to provide a clue as to the location of the next golden ratio.

The length divided by the width of the rectangle in the centre of the ceiling = 1.618 = the golden ratio or Phi.

Symbolically the four tassels hangs from the corners of a golden rectangle as if to provide extra emphasis to the importance of Temperance, fortitude, prudence and justice.

We do not even have to go up to the ceiling and gather measurements to prove that the ceiling contains the golden rectangle. All we need to do is measure the length and width of the building and use simple math to prove the case:

The length of the lodge is 36 feet 2 inches = 434 inches

The width of the lodge is 26 feet 2 inches = 314 inches

The length to width ratio of the lodge is 434/314 = 1.382

It can be shown that if there is a golden rectangle in the ceiling with 4 squares on each corner, that the ratio of the length to the width of the building is:

$$3 - phi or 3 - 1.618 =$$

1.382 = Building length / building width

Actual measurements confirm that the building length (434 inches) divided by the building width 314 inches is indeed 1.382


We are indeed very fortunate here Goodwood to have such a mathematically perfect building. Our founding brethren came up with a brilliant way of reminding us of the importance of the science of mathematics in architecture and linked the lodge ornaments to the design in the ceiling and the dimensions of the building itself.

(For the written proof of the Golden rectangle in the ceiling of Goodwood Lodge, see appendix 1 below)

Appendix 1: The Golden Ratio (phi = 1.618) and the Ceiling of Goodwood Lodge

Measurements give the Interior length (AB) of Goodwood lodge =434 inches (36feet 2 inches) and the width (BC) = 314 inches (26 feet 2 inches). Ratio AB/BC = 434/314 = 1.386. Measurements also show that KLOP is a square and AKRE, LBFM, QGDP and HNOC are also identical squares. Using this information show that (EF/FH = Golden Ratio =1.618)

<u>Method</u>: Assume EFGH is a golden ratio and calculate the ratio AB/BC to see if it is the same as the actual measurements 434/314 = 1.382



Proof

```
Assume EFGH is a golden rectangle then EF/FH = phi (i.e. EF = phi and FH = 1)

Now KLOP is a square therefore LO = EF = phi

LO = phi = LF + HO + FH, LF = FH (both sides of equal squares) and FH = 1

Therefore phi = 2LF + 1. Now LB = LF (sides of square)

Therefore phi = 2LB + 1, rearranging LB = (phi-1)/2

Now LB= AK (sides of square), and AB = phi + LB + AK = phi + 2LB

Therefore AB = phi + (phi - 1) = 2phi - 1

AB/BC = (2phi-1)/phi= 2-1/phi = 2-(phi-1) = 2-phi+1=3-phi

AB/BC = 3-1.618 = 1.382
```

Actual measurements show AB/BC= 434/314 = 1.382. This proves that Goodwood Lodge was designed to include a golden rectangle in the centre of the ceiling.
